

Community Manager Update

• Closings and Cancellations:

Due to the Coronavirus Pandemic and following the advice of the CDC, the Ohio State Department of Health and our attorneys, the Lodge is closed to residents and all events are canceled through April (at a minimum). This includes the postponement of the Annual Meeting. We will be closely following this situation as it develops and will keep you informed of any changes. Check the website and/or email blasts for the latest news. This was a difficult decision but it was made in the interest of the health of Avenbury residents.

• Hastings Lifeguards:

If you or someone you know would like to be a Lifeguard this summer, please contact Hastings at 440-832-7700 or visit their website at hastingswaterworks.com.

- Metal Recycling for Earth Day: This has been canceled for 2020. Hopefully we'll continue in 2021.
- Snow Plow Damage: Please report any damage caused by snow removal equipment to the Information Center by April 1, 2020. If there is damage to your irrigation system discovered once the system has been turned on, please contact the Information Center at that time.

• No Prune Agreement:

This form should be turned into the Information Center by May 1, 2020 for those residents who do NOT want Brightview to weed, trim trees, trim shrubs or other plants that require specialized care (roses, hydrangeas, mugo pine and rhododendrons) in their home owner beds. Please see the form included in this issue of the Breeze.

• Geese:

Please do not feed the geese including ground feeding around bird feeders! If you see any nesting activity, please call the Info Center so that we can limit nests and notify Ohio Geese Control of their locations. The geese are nesting early this year, pairing off into couples. Male geese may be aggressive at this time of the year, so do not approach them!

• Trees:

Each year dead and/or diseased trees are removed from the property. The Board then must decide which trees to replace. Typically, front yard trees are replaced and rear yard trees are not. However, if you would like to have a tree in the rear yard replaced, the option exists to submit a request to the Landscape Committee for consideration. The resident would pay for the cost of the tree and installation, and the HOA would maintain it going forward. Also, Trees that were removed in the fall will have the stumps ground and some areas will be replanted with grass as the weather warms up.

Irrigation and Over Watering:

As we move into the summer months, please be mindful of over watering turf areas. This can lead to turf diseases and insect damage. Per Brightview, under typical conditions irrigation should run for a maximum of 10 minutes 3-4 days per week. This of course is weather dependent. Residents may also benefit from a Solar Sync module that automatically turns irrigation systems off and on depending on weather and soil conditions. This device can save substantial amounts of money on your water bill.

• Modification Form Reminder:

If you are planning on making changes to the exterior of your home (for example: lights, windows, doors, satellite dishes) or changing your landscaping (removing more than 3 plants, removing or planting a tree), you must submit a Modification Form to either the Architectural or Landscape Committee. They will review your request and give you a fast answer with best results if they have the request early in the month. The Info Center can answer questions about the process and we have an Architectural Standards Book available for common replacement components.

• Property Inspections:

Please check the Rules and Regs regarding Landscaping in home owner beds. Some common issues include: vegetable and herb plants placed in areas other than the rear bed where they are allowed, no more than 3 yard art items in the front and side yards combined, no more than 10 flower pots in the front and side yards combined, no pots or bird feeders in any common areas.

Property Clean-up 2020

Spring is just around the corner, time to clean up all of the debris that has accumulated on our streets, especially on Shakespeare and Middleton, over the winter. The Buildings and Grounds Committee is asking for your help in removing the debris.

A spring clean-up is scheduled for **Monday April 13**, with a rain date of **Wednesday April 15**, and a rain date back-up date of **Friday April 17**. Volunteers are needed to help with this project. Please wear gloves and sturdy shoes. Bags will be provided. There will be approximately 12 street captains to direct volunteers in their assigned areas.

We will meet at 10:00AM at the Lodge Parking Lot.

Landscape Committee News



April is here and hopefully we will be able to get outside and enjoy some warmer days. Daylight Savings Time has afforded us more sunlight it seems, so we can be outdoors longer. Our plants are beginning to show signs of new life by forming buds and breaking through the cold earth. Soon we will have those beautiful spring colors blooming and the grass turning green.

You will now have a better idea which plants are in full sun and which are in partial to full shade. This is important to note, because it will help you to pick the right plants for the right spot in your yard. Too many times we put a shade loving plant in the sun and shortly we have a dead plant or at the very least struggling. This would be the time to move them, if they are in a place that does not afford them the best chance of survival. This sounds like a minor thing, but it is very important to give your plants the best growing conditions possible.

It's also time to start shopping for the soilless mix and the few annuals that are starting to arrive at the nurseries. These plants can tolerate the cooler days and nights. Pansies are a good choice and will give you 2 months of color before they start to fade. There are some hardy annual seeds that can be sown right into the soil. Try some Portulaca, cosmos or some sweet alyssum.

We have had our beds cleaned out so it is time to amend the soil with some compost and some slow release organic fertilizer.

Now we also have to contend with weed growth. They are the hardiest of all the plants. If you are able, try and pull them when they first appear. This is when the root system is easier to remove and just maybe they won't return. There is no fool proof way to prevent weeds.

Remember that April showers bring May flowers and we certainly need something to look forward to.
